We are writing regarding the Western Red Cedar (nicknamed "Luma"), located in the Wedgwood neighborhood at 3849 NE 88th Street, Seattle, WA 98115. In a <u>letter</u> to the City of Seattle, dated July 19, 2023, the Snoqualmie Indian Tribe documented the status of "Luma" as "a culturally modified tree (CMT) that delineated an ancient indigenous trail system connecting Puget Sound to Lake Washington, and an archaeological site subject to special protections under Washington State law."

While we understand that avenues for action at this juncture on this site may be limited, we would welcome the opportunity to work with you, local Tribes, and community stakeholders in crafting a solution. We look forward to being creative for this specific instance within the abilities the City and State have, given the cultural significance of this CMT. We thank you for working to find a resolution to this specific CMT, and for joint work in the future to address this unique situation.
